# FRANCOISE LANNOY A woman as president

What are the differences between the present Congress and the previous one?

We based our programme initially on what was done in 1990. But we have gradually added things, for instance the five topics that will serve as focal points for discussions throughout the week

### What are these topics?

As a team we have tried to find out which topics "bothered" European students in 1992. A com-mon theme will obviously be Europe, its proble-ms and its future. First of all we will consider the "position of Europe in the world", where it stands compared to the United States or Japan, how it will be affected by the collapse of the US-SR. These questions cannot be avoided at a time when wars rages in Yugoslavia and the European Community proves itself powerless to act.

Environment is the second unavoidable topic. The third topic, "A Europe with twelve or thirty countries?" should be of interest to all, but especially to representatives of Central European countries. The fourth topic raises the question of social policy within the European comunity. We have called the fifth and last topic "European De mocracy" rather than exclusions or racism wi mocracy "rather than exclusions or racism wi-thin Europe. This would have had an immediate mediatic appeal. But we prefer considering the problems of democracy in general, whether in the East European countries faced with a new form of capitalism, or in the rise of faccism both east and west. I am convinced that these topics will appeal to local students as well as to our forei gn guests.

#### How will those discussions be organized?

On Monday afternoon five lecturers will introduce the five topics at the same time but in five different lecture rooms on the Sart Tilman campus. Each lecturer will be a specialist in the cho-sen field. Madame Laurette Onkelinx, for instance, who as Belgian Minister for Environment was ce, who as begin in minuter for Entronmetal was our representative at the Rio Conference, will in-troduce the discussions on environment. In each case we have selected people who can help us to formulate concrete propositions.

On Wednesday morning students will meet in groups of 20 to 30 and discuss one of the topics. An organizer from the previous congress will lead debates which will be summarized by a spo-keman chosen from the floor. Of course these de-



bates are open to local students too.

They will continue on Friday afternoon. Having shared their conclusions at a plenary session, we would like each student and each university to gi-ve some kind of undertaking. With respect to the environnement, for instance, every university could launch a campaign for recycling its own pa per.

#### Will the press echo those debates ?

Absolutely! We want things to be clear and con-Absolutely, we wait things to be clear and con-crete. We'll send a report to the press, but also to the concerned ministeries, and each participant will commit her/himself to make our conclu-sions known within his or her university. We know that the media are interested in these debates and are ready to broadcast our conclusion

How many students have actually taken part in this organization?

There are 25 students on the coordinating committee. More widely, there are some sixty stu-dents involved in the organization of the Congress

# Are some faculties more responsive than others? Is the congress "owned" by one faculty ?

Not at all ! While some faculties are indeed more involved in general coordination, others are more concerned with producing a good programme from within the faculty itself.

Which faculties are involved in the general coordination?

Mostly engineers, people from Applied Sciences. You can feel the influence of the *Cercle Europe In-génieurs* in this. The Arts Faculty, on the other hand, has done an excellent job in unifying its se veral departments around a single approach. Si-milarly, you will see very few medical students on the coordinating committee, but their program-me is simply superb.

Two years ago, the Law Faculty was reluctant to join in. Are they more forthcoming this year ?

Very much so, thanks to the ELSA group (Euro-pean Law Student Association) that has taken over the organization within the Law Faculty.

How much will the Congress cost?

We started with a budget of BEF 6 millions, but we had to reduce our ambitions. We now reckor on something like 3 millions.

#### Where does the money come from ?

The University helps us a lot. We also receive mo In conversion y arrys us not. we also receive mo-ney from other public bodies. It is more difficult with private companies. When we get in touch, they tell us that this is a great idea but they are sor-ry there is no money left !

Will you have enough money to cover the costs?

Enough at least for things to work. Nothing should be left out of the programme. We only hope that the profits will balance the costs.

There were 850 participants two years ago. So-me speak of 1,000 participants this year. Does it sound realistic ?

If people keep registering at the present rate, it certainly does. At present (i.e. one month before the Congress begins) we already have 750 firm re-gistrations. And we receive an average of 30 every day...

The academic authorities see in this congress an opportunity to stress the European dimension of the University of Liège. What kind of relations have you had with these authorities?

We have to mention the substantial help we have received from Vice-Rector Willy Legros and Rector Arthur Bodson. M. Legros's contacts in the worlds of busisness and politics have proved extremely useful. Our university has everything to gain from the congress: the media will be full of it. It is a great showcase.

Since you have used the word show, i believe the European Marquee will be the Congress em-blem once again this year?

That it will ! Like last time, it will be built on the "esplanade des Sciences", between the Psycholo-gy Faculty and the Law Faculty. This year, howegy Faculty and the Law Faculty. I his year, nowe-ver, we ordered a bigger and more stable marquee than the one we had in 1990, which proved inade-quate for the parties we held in the evenings. And this time we do expect quite a lot of people, especially for the "Nuit du Rock" (Rock Night) on Wednesday.

# Tell me, Françoise, what is your dearest wish a few weeks before the congress is launched ?

That everything will run smoothly, without any major hitch, ... and to relax and to be able to say on the evening of the 21st november . It's all over at last. Now I can have a good sleep!

# THE 1865 CONGRESS

# The Marseillaise before the Internationale

Dear Sirs and Members of the Students Congress, your invitation has just Dear sits and memoers of the Students Congress, your invitation has just reached me before I leave for Guernesey. I regret I am unable to attend your noble and touching meeting. Your Students Congress shows a fortunate initiative. You prove the existence of evolution. That is good. Today, you bring into being through the brotherhood of peoples what we dream of for tomorrow. Who but you, young people, should constitute the avant-oardel(1)avant-garde? ( ... ).

he most clear-sighted among you will already have recognized Victor Hugo's prose behind this text. The great writer was then answering the invitation sent to him by the organizers of the first Liège International Students Congress in 1865. Hugo, just as Guizot, Thiers, Dupanloup, Littré, and others, are already "great" adults. Nevertheless, the already students have made of them their intellectual students have hade of them them interfectual models. What can be more normal than inviting the intellectual guides of the then studious youth for such an exceptional meeting? Alas! All of them, ungrateful as they were, shied away... Even so, the organizers had taken precautions. So as not to offend those people's sensibilities, they had voluntarily ousted other guides who were too voluntarily ousted other guides who were too controversial to be approved unanimously: Marx, Blanqui, Renan, Michelet, Montalembert, Veuillot. A pity, for a confrontation between say, Veuillot (ultra-uncompromising catholic) and Marx (ultra-socialist middle-class) would have excited everybody's curiosity. There are also

some others whose aura never ceased planing over the debates: Comte and Proudhon, whose writings, rather than their tombs, served as shrines. Today one would call that sort of pilgrimage the "relics cult"

But why gather 1400 European students (accommodated by their Liège counterparts) at the University of Liège from October 29th till November 1st 1865? In order to talk about "education", just as the organizers had planned they would? Well, yes and no. The students of that time were not really like us: students of that time were not really like us: they were hopelessly addicted to politics, as well as verbal sparring match fanatics. As L.-E. Halkin, historian of the Congress, makes it clear, they will thus talk about "education, politics, education policy and even education in politics " in those few days. In a consting room education by the days. In a meeting room galvanized by the inflammatory words of French students who came to Liege to shout out their disgust for Napoléon III, "le petit", as Hugo used to The way the debates were developing shows



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the evolution of social and political ideas that drove that youth: anticlericalism, extreme radicalism (which sometimes bordered anarchism), praising of republican ideas (especially among the French), scientific claims. The chanceries were disturbed by those bold words. The French Foreign Minister, among others, demanded a detailed report. The "agitators" were arrested or excluded from their Faculties when they came back from Liège. Reports of the Liège debates were published in all international newspapers. Europe's eyes were riveted on the "Cité ardente"!

As a conclusion to this great gathering, the students were invited to attend a banquet, followed by a ball. That was the beginning another celebration. Throughout Liège's alleys, euphoric students started singing the "students' Marseillaise", which had been composed during the Congress. Its chorus was spreading in the night : Arise, Students! The Congress's flag finally united the soldiers of Progress...

CHRONICLE OF THE 1990 CONGRESS Remember, all of you, two years ago...

The Europe of tomorrow, the Europe of the citizens will also be the Europe of the students. The latter will be more and more numerous to carry on with their studies abroad in an increasing number of universities; and the most appreciated will be those who enjoy an international reputation. The University of Liège is conscious of this, and in order to avoid becoming a second-best only university, it has decided to react and attract the attention of students from all over Europe with one feat.

herefore Mr Legros, Vice-Rector of our Alma Mater, agreed in 1989 to let students organize a European Stu-dents Congress. In accordance with the Vice-Rector's wishes, this Congress would on the one hand revive the medieval tradition of mobility dear to Erasmus or the thinkers of mobility dear to Erasmus or the ininkers of the Enlightenment; and on the other hand revive a nearer past by reminding us of this Congress held in 1865 by Liège students. All in all, it would be a unique event, a multi-disciplinary Congress bringing together stu-dents from different nationalities and from various universities

An organizing team was quickly formed. The work was entrusted to a handful of students mostly moving in the circles of our main Stu-dents Society, the FEDE (the Students Federation of the University of Liège). Nonetheless they were given material and moral sup-port by the academic authorities. But the tasks to be done were far from easy: the newly created team had to familiarize themselves hastily with press conference or sponsorship techniques, and to find out how best to feed accommodate, transport, inform, interest and even entertain a rather heterogenous crowd. And they were in a hurry, since the Congress was due to open in November 1990. One year of preparation is not much! The organi-zers shared out the work among different committees in order to avoid losing too much of that precious little time. Besides, it was also decided that the main (and mostly common) activities would be set up by the participating

Faculties, which was an excellent opportu-nity to learn to work hand in hand, that is to discover the meaning of interfaculty coopera-

On D-Day-1, a reception committee was sent to the Guillemins Station to welcome the 850 guests coming from 27 different countries. The latter were then sent over to the Val Benoît campus where their hosts/hos-tesses (that is the Liège students and their families) took charge of them. The distribution was not carried out without difficulty! We eventually succeeded in separating the group of Hungarian girls who insisted they should remain together. And the Liège student who had been arguing for over two hours with anyone near enough because she wanted to accommodate a German student and no Frenchman was satisfied. Everybody did find some accommodation, even the late-comers and the unexpected newcomers. The 1990 Congress could start at last. On November 4th, after the usual (and a little long-windep) speeches, all the students were invited to talk about European students exchange programs, such as Erasmus, Comett, Lingua,... in the marquee set up on the Sart Tilman cam-pus. The Congress attendees did in fact debate during the whole week, since each Faculty was offering a great choice of lectures which favoured the contacts. Many students from Hungary, Bulgaria, Rumania, Czechoslo-vakia, ... answered the call of their Liège counterparts. The Congress became conse-quently an unhoped-for meeting place for

the ambassadors of the young generations from both the East and the West. It was finally possible to communicate, to talk about daily concerns, to quibble about philosophical questions, and above all to exchange opinions about political, economic and social choices for their different home countries.

But all work, and no play, makes Jack a dull boy! That's why the organizers had planned to have a Sports Day and some guided tours. The students from all over Europe thus disco-vered special sites, museums, exhibitions, natural sanctuaries... Of course, there was no such thing as a trip without any panic: losing people, then one's head, and fortunately finding both again. The European Congress could also be attended "by night": concerts, folklore, and chiefly, one might say, the inescapable Faculty parties! Regardless of where they were organized (under the marquee or in the city), those parties did draw many people. Belgian beer was flowing freely and seemed to be approved unanimously by the guests. The good-natured atmosphere often turned quite wild. Give us some steam... At dawn, one discovers that the meaning of celebration is universal

Which conclusion should we draw from all this? This extraordinary event was regarded by all as a success. It allowed us to draw up a "European Students Charter", boosted the development of programs between universities, and, last but not least, made human contacts possible. The only things we deplore are that few if any students from other Belgian uni-versities took part (they had been invited in the same way as their foreign counterparts) some Faculties or Departments of our University showed a complete lack of interest, and English was used much too sparsely du-ring the lectures (the language of this text seems to show something ... ). But I am sure the organizers of the coming Congress have ta-ken account of those problems! The only thing left for me to say is that I wish the 1992 Congress as much success and mostly as mu ch vitality as its first edition.
